

THE FIRST READING

Acts 9:1-20

¹ Meanwhile Saul, still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord, went to the high priest ² and asked him for letters to the synagogues at Damascus, so that if he found any who belonged to the Way, men or women, he might bring them bound to Jerusalem. 3 Now as he was going along and approaching Damascus, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. ⁴ He fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to him, "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?" ⁵ He asked, "Who are you, Lord?" The reply came, "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting. ⁶ But get up and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do." ⁷The men who were traveling with him stood speechless because they heard the voice but saw no one. 8 Saul got up from the ground, and though his eyes were open, he could see nothing; so they led him by the hand and brought him into Damascus. 9 For three days he was without sight and neither ate nor drank.

¹⁰ Now there was a disciple in Damascus named Ananias. The Lord said to him in a vision, "Ananias." He answered, "Here I am, Lord." ¹¹ The Lord said to him, "Get up and go to the street called Straight, and at the house of Judas look for a man of Tarsus named Saul. At this moment he is praying, ¹² and he has seen in a vision a man named Ananias come in and lav his hands on him so that he might regain his sight." 13 But Ananias answered, "Lord, I have heard from many about this man, how much evil he has done to your saints in Jerusalem, 14 and here he has authority from the chief priests to bind all who invoke your name." 15 But the Lord said to him, "Go, for he is an instrument whom I have chosen to bring my name before gentiles and kings and before the people of Israel; ¹⁶I myself will show him how much he must suffer for the sake of my name." 17 So Ananias went and entered the house. He laid his hands on Saul and said, "Brother Saul, the Lord Jesus, who appeared to you on your way here, has sent me so that you may regain your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit." 18 And immediately something like scales fell from his eyes, and his sight was restored. Then he got up and was baptized, ¹⁹ and after taking some food, he regained his strength. For several days he was with the disciples in Damascus, ²⁰ and immediately he began to proclaim Jesus in the synagogues, saying, "He is the Son of God."

THE GOSPEL READING

John 21:1-19

¹ After these things Jesus showed himself again to the disciples by the Sea of Tiberias; and he showed himself in this way. ² Gathered there together were Simon Peter, Thomas called the Twin, Nathanael of Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zebedee, and two others of his disciples. ³ Simon Peter said to them, "I am going fishing." They said to him, "We will go with you." They went out and got into the boat, but that night they caught nothing.

⁴ Just after daybreak, Jesus stood on the beach; but the disciples did not know that it was Jesus. ⁵ Jesus said to them, "Children, you have no fish, have you?" They answered him, "No." ⁶ He said to them, "Cast the net to the right side of the boat, and you will find some." So they cast it, and now they were not able to haul it in because there were so many fish. ⁷ That disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, "It is the Lord!" When Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord, he put on some clothes, for he was naked, and jumped into the sea. ⁸ But the other disciples came in the boat, dragging the net full of fish, for they were not far from the land, only about a hundred yards off.

⁹ When they had gone ashore, they saw a charcoal fire there, with fish on it, and bread. ¹⁰ Jesus said to them, "Bring some of the fish that you have just caught." ¹¹ So Simon Peter went aboard and hauled the net ashore, full of large fish, a hundred fifty-three of them; and though there were so many, the net was not torn. ¹² Jesus said to them, "Come and have breakfast." Now none of the disciples dared to ask him, "Who are you?" because they knew it was the Lord. ¹³ Jesus came and took the bread and gave it to them, and did the same with the fish. ¹⁴ This was now the third time that Jesus appeared to the disciples after he was raised from the dead.

¹⁵ When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, "Simon son of John, do you love me more than these?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my lambs." ¹⁶ A second time he said to him, "Simon son of John, do you love me?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Tend my sheep." ¹⁷ He said to him the third time, "Simon son of John, do you love me?" Peter felt hurt because he said to him the third time, "Do you love me?" And he said to him, "Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my sheep. ¹⁸ Very truly, I tell you, when you were younger, you used to fasten your own belt and to go wherever you wished. But when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will fasten a belt around you and take you where you do not wish to go." ¹⁹ (He

said this to indicate the kind of death by which he would glorify God.) After this he said to him, "Follow me."

Kirkin' of the Tartans

A Brief History: The Christian Faith first came to Scotland in 563 when St. Columba established a monastic community on the island of lona. Decades later, in the 16th century, the Protestant Reformation swept western Europe. One branch of Protestantism was given its name by Queen Elizabeth I, who observed, "the Swiss are more reforming than the Lutherans." More broadly the word "Reformed" referred to a Church "reformed, always reforming according to the Word of God and the call of the Spirit." It was John Knox who brought this Reformed Church to Scotland in 1547. Here Reformed Christians were for the first time referred to in terms of the polity of the church as taught by John Calvin in Geneva and implemented by Knox: "Presbyterians." So, while "Reformed" refers to our theology, Presbyterian refers to our polity, declaring that we are a church governed by "presbyters" ("elders"). The Kirkin' of the Tartans ("Blessing of the families of the "Kirk" or "Church") is a service that was begun in the U. S. in 1941 by the Reverend Peter Marshall, chaplain of the U. S. Senate and Pastor of the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church in Washington, D. C. It was Marshall's intention to assist the British War relief and the Scottish Clans Evacuation Plan for impoverished families of Scotland. Eventually, the service came to be celebrated across the United States in witness to the rich heritage of Scottish Christianity where "Presbyterianism" was born. recognize our Scottish heritage as families and as Presbyterians when we celebrate Scots Heritage Day. Here are some of the special elements of our service today: Background: Kirk is the Scottish word for church. The tartans, with their distinctive plaids, represent specific Scottish clans, families, regions, and regiments. The Kirkin' O' the Tartans is the presentation of a Scottish family's symbol, its tartan, at church for a blessing.

The Beadle: During the Middle Ages and through the Reformation, Bibles were rare among the common people. The Bible of the Kirk (the church) was a treasured possession. The value of the sacred scriptures and the danger of theft led to the establishment of a special lay office within the Kirk known as The Beadle. The Beadle begins the worship service by carrying the Bible ceremoniously into the sanctuary.

Bagpipes: The bagpipe is a musical instrument now regarded as the national instrument of Scotland. Each clan had its own bagpiper and its fame was based to some extent on the bagpiper's ability.

The Flags: The official flag of Scotland is the Saltire, a white diagonal cross on a dark blue field. It represents Andrew, Scotland's patron saint. A red lion, on a yellow field, has been the Royal Arms of Scotland since the days of King Alexander II (1198-1249).

Tartans and Plaid: Perhaps no symbol is more associated with Scotland traditions than the colorful traditions associated with highland dress. The tradition of the Tartan is an old one, and there are many references to it in early Scottish literature. The ancient Tartan was described as "Chequered or striped or sundrie coloured". For many centuries Tartans formed part of the everyday dress of the Highland people, and it was there its use continued and developed until it became recognized as a symbol of clan kinship.

Psalm Singing: Perhaps the most traditional Scottish custom still preserved in Presbyterian churches today is the addition of Psalm singing. Originally, Scottish Presbyterians believed that only scriptural material should be used in praise of God. From this tradition developed metrical versions of the Psalms. It is important to know that the metrical versions of the Psalms were never intended to be Bible translations. Words and phrases are frequently moved around to arrange for the proper meter.

The Scots Confession: The Scots Confession is the first reformed confession in the English language. It has been labeled the charter of the Church of Scotland and of world Presbyterianism. The Scottish Parliament, at the conclusion of a civil war, invited John Knox and five colleagues to prepare a confession of faith for the church and the nation. They did their work in four days. On August 17, 1560, Knox and his colleagues had written a confession designed to solidify Scotland politically and ecclesiastically. The nation would henceforth fly a Protestant flag, emblazoned with the cross of St. Andrew.
