By the time you read this it will be Thanksgiving and then the First Sunday of Advent. Sometimes it happens, a national holiday and a religious one back-to-back. I see some significance in the pairing of these two. Both have a kind of double sidedness in their meaning. Each has roots in the past, while pointing to the future.

First, think of Thanksgiving as the time we reflect on the personal blessings of the past year for which we are grateful. Of course, the history of the day goes farther back in national memory. I don't mean Plymouth Rock and the pilgrims, though I do remember wearing a black construction paper hat in second grade to mark that occasion. Rather, I'm thinking of President Lincoln's proclamation of a day of national thanks and prayer during the Civil War. God's providence extends deep and wide.

Thanksgiving has a future dimension as well. I can't remember where I read it or who said it, and I can't find it to quote, so I will have to paraphrase as best I can, because I know it's true: The past is not an inheritance we receive; it is a legacy we pass on to our children. That legacy we repeat whenever we say the pledge of allegiance: "with liberty and justice for all." I think that, whenever we celebrate Thanksgiving as a national holiday, we might consider recommitting ourselves to that legacy.

In a similar vein, Advent has both a past and future vision. The word "advent" refers to preparing for something. In our Christian context, it means preparing to celebrate the birth of our Savior, Jesus Christ. As we tell our kids, we're getting ready for Jesus' birthday. In one sense, that birthday happened over 2,000 years ago. That it is still timely goes without saying. Or maybe that it the deeper point in our world, where you can find all kinds of store ads, Christmas TV specials, muzak and parades without Christ ever being mentioned. The season of Advent is meant to remind us that we are preparing for the future—God's future in and through us in Christ. We light the candles on the Advent wreath, including the Christ Candle on Christmas Eve, not only to mark off this year, but to keep before us the truth that God is bringing to fulfillment all that is promised in scripture: a new heaven and a new earth where sin and evil and all their results are no more. Surely that is a future to prepare for.

REMINDERS OF HOW YOU CAN CONTINUE TO BE GOOD STEWARDS OF GOD'S EARTH DURING THE CHRISTMAS SEASON

- Avoid using disposable plates, forks and spoons, cups, etc. Get out your beautiful china, good silver, and all your other special dishes that are in your cupboards to use this Christmas (or any time!).
- Choose gifts that are earth friendly.
- Use gift bags that can be reused for another Christmas. And go easy on the tissue paper that everyone puts in them! If your family doesn't make too much fun of you, it can be smoothed out, rolled or folded and used again!
- Remember to recycle all those boxes. Just be sure to break them down and remove all packaging materials.
- If you decorate with a live tree, be sure to recycle it at Waterworth Memorial Park after Christmas.
- If you do use wrapping paper, it can also be recycled (but not metallic paper). Be sure to remove all tags, ribbons, and bows.
- Your Christmas cards can also be recycled, but not if they are metallic, or have glitter on them
- When grocery shopping, remember to take your reusable shopping bags or you can ask for your groceries to be bagged in paper bags.
- Be sure to take all your plastic bags, bubble wrap etc. to Giant Eagle to recycle.
- Please avoid using single use plastic items in any way!

Do what you can. Every small effort on our part really makes a difference.
